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Counterfeit Medicines: Definition

World Health Organization (WHO)

- A counterfeit medicine is one which is deliberately and fraudulently mislabeled with respect to identity and or source. Counterfeiting can apply to both branded and generic products and counterfeit medicines include:
 - Products with correct ingredients but mislabelled
 - Products with undeclared ingredients
 - Products with the wrong ingredients (16%)
 - Products lacking active ingredients (60%)
 - Product with insufficient amounts of active ingredients (17%)



Counterfeit Medicines: Definition

- Any false representation in relation to a product's identity, history or source.
- Applies to a product's:
 - Packaging
 - Manufacturing
 - Labelling



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Counterfeit Medicines: Grey Market Goods




- **Grey Market goods** or parallel imports are genuine products, but imported without the authority of the brand owner.
- Diverted products destined for different markets which are resold in order to capitalize on pricing differences or currency exchange fluctuations between jurisdictions.
- Enter through "grey market" channels:
 - Distributors create secondary channels for bargains
 - Diverted from the legal supply chain



Counterfeit Medicines: Global Impact



• Trade in counterfeit goods represents an estimated 5-7% of all worldwide trade

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Counterfeit Medicines: North America



- In 2013, FDA seized and shut down 1677 illegal pharmacy websites which mimicked Canadian pharmacies.
- 88% of imported privately imported pharmaceuticals were counterfeit and contained potentially harmful ingredients
- In 2012, the FDA reported as many as 1446 eBay ads selling diabetes strips which were likely counterfeits



Counterfeit Medicines: Prevalence



- The problem is prevalent and is increasing rapidly undermining the integrity of the global pharmaceutical supply chain
- Center for Medicine in the Public Interests estimates:
 - Worldwide counterfeit drugs sales rise 13% annually
 - Nearly twice as quickly as the pace of legitimate drugs
 - Fake drugs are approaching a \$75 billion industry



Counterfeit Medicines: Rationale

• Why does it happen:

- Global market reach via the internet
- Highly profitable low penalties
- Technology to copy products is widely available
- Law enforcement's ability to detect and prosecute this crime is hindered by:
 - Shortage of financial resources
 - Lack of coordination between countries
 - Weak anti-counterfeiting laws




FIGURE 1 – Examples of samples used in the study: counterfeit Viagra[®] (A-F), authentic Viagra[®] (V), counterfeit Cialis[®] (G-L) and genuine Cialis[®] (T).



Counterfeit Medicines: Frequently Counterfeited Drugs


- Ambien (Sleep medication)

 - Loss of control of supply chain and faith in suppliers FASKEN








Counterfeit Medicines: Authentication
